<u>Paul Arculus</u>, This year, 2014, marks the 210th anniversary of one of the most devastating events in early nineteenth century Canada, the sinking of the Speedy. And, it all started here on Lake Scugog. In the spring of 1804, John Sharp, a fur trader was murdered on Washburn Island at the north end of Lake Scugog. As a result, an Ojibwa man by the name of Ogetonicut, was arrested and charged with the murder and placed in jail in York (now Toronto). A surveyor was sent to Lake Scugog to determine which administrative district the murder had taken place. When he showed that Washburn Island was in the Newcastle district, east of the Home District, the legal authorities ordered the trial to be held in the brand new settlement of Newcastle on Presqu'ile. The prisoner and the leading judiciary were put on a boat named Speedy and set sail for Newcastle on Sunday, October 7, 1804.

As they approached Presqu'ile that evening, a severe storm rose up and sank the vessel and all on board perished. An investigation into the incident revealed a series of scandals in the administration of the province, its attitude toward First Nations and corruption reaching up to the highest levels of the government. The consequences of this tragedy can be found in many areas of life in Ontario, even today.

In Paul's presentation, he will discuss these matters and show how the incident of the Speedy affected the early history of Scugog and in particular, Port Perry's Bigelow family and the man who surveyed Reach and Blackstock Townships, Samuel Wilmot. On display will be a copy of the map made by the surveyor for the case, a map that was thought to have disappeared with the Speedy. This intriguing map shows Lake Scugog before the dam was erected at Lindsay raising the level of the lake by seven feet. The talk will be held at our regular LSHS meeting at St. John's Presbyterian Church on Wednesday December 10th.

Scugog and the Fenian Raids of 1866 - Paul Arculus

The Lake Scugog Historical Society's September tour of the Prince Albert cemetery was unfortunately cancelled. In preparing for the walk, I had decided to mention the Fenian Raids and Scugog's role in the affair and to pay our respects to some of the local lads who took part in the defense of our country in 1866.

In previous walks we always stopped at the grave of Thomas Chalmers Forman, known as Major Forman, a distinguished Scotsman who played a key role in early Scugog history. Major Forman, a grain merchant, lived on King Street in Prince Albert and built a barn in 1863 to be used as a drill shed for the local militia. He posted advertisements in the local papers to raise a local militia company. It was initially called the Reach Volunteer Infantry Company when it was formed in 1863. Forman took on the responsibility of teaching military tactics and maneuvers to the Prince Albert Infantry in his drill shed. When the Fenian Raids took place in 1866 and there was a call for arms, Forman's Company had been renamed the Prince Albert Infantry Company and it was well prepared.

I thought that it would be of interest to read out a list of the men who made their way to York to take part in the defense of our country against the Fenians. Port Perry resident, Gary Roncetti has made a life-long interest in compiling lists of those who have served Canada in all its battles from the 1812 War to the Korean War. His research into Canada's military history has been used by television and movie producers and he has published several valuable books on his research. Gary provided me with a list of the Prince Albert Infantry Company as it was at the time of the Fenian Raids of 1866.

Here is his list of the 28 men of the Company: John Blight, John Breen, Reuben Crandell (son of Reuben Crandell, the first white settler in Reach) Alfred Dennis, Johnston Devitt, Samson Devitt, William Devitt, Peter Fitchett (son of the founder of Fitchett's Corners, now Manchester), Louis Gerow, William Gibson, Alex Graham, Henry Graham, Thomas Graham, Joseph Holtby, William Jamieson, A. E. McCaw, Alex McConnel, James McConnel, Thomas Martin, William Nott, Thomas Patterson, George W. Pettit (Scugog Island), Joseph Raines, James Rodman, William J. Shunk (Scugog Island), James P. Taylor, William Warrian, William Wicklem, Thomas Wilson. The Company was led by Captain Joshua Wright, Lieutenant J.W. Allison, Lieutenant John Billings and Ensign Thomas Graham. Most of these men lie at rest in the cemetery.

"Captain Forman received instructions to report his company to Major Fairbanks at Oshawa. The Company assembled in the Town Hall at an early hour on Saturday morning. The order to "Fall In" was given between 6 and 7 o'clock. The men were addressed by Messrs. G. Currie, A. Hurd Sr., J. Baird and Rev. T. Sobs. Every person in the village and for miles around was present to cheer and encourage our noble boys on the path to glory and honour." So it was reported in the local newspaper, the Ontario Observer.

The company made its way to Oshawa. There were seven taverns on this route and it is not reported how many of these the men stopped at on the way, however it is reported "... a little beyond Columbus they came to a place where an old Cornishman had rolled out two barrels of cider to the side of the road and stood ready with his two daughters to dispense the drinks."

Once in Oshawa and in good spirits Captain Forman handed the leadership over to Captain Joshua Wright and assumed his role as Captain in the Oshawa Company. All boarded the train for York where the Prince Albert Company carried out several duties including guarding the jail at York where a number of Fenian prisoners were being held. They returned to Prince Albert on June 19 to accolades and praise. On the evening of Friday June 22, a supper was given in the Town Hall in honour of the volunteers. "Tables were laid for two hundred. The luxuries and substantials of the season were supplied by Messrs. Moggridge and Hiscocks."

Later Captain Forman was promoted to Major. It wasn't until 1890 that the Canadian Military Medal was made available to all those who had taken part in the Fenian Raids and were still alive.
